Use pictures to complete the activities. Pictures can be photographs, illustrations, artwork, or even maps.

Who/What is the most important person/object in this picture? How do you know? Use details from the image to support your reasoning.	Is this picture new or old? When might this picture have been created? How do you know? What details in the picture support your thinking?	In this picture, who/what is the most _____ (-est)? How do you know? Use details from the image to support your explanation.	Is this picture a good example of _____? Why or why not?
Make a list of questions you have about this picture. Choose 1 or 2 to investigate. Where did you go for information? What did you find out?	Use this picture to create a single frame story, providing speech or thought bubbles to the people, objects, or both.	List as many adjectives as you can to describe someone or something in this picture. Then use your list to create a written biographical or descriptive sketch or poem.	What is the topic of this picture or the story that it tells? Create a movie poster or a book jacket (front cover and inside summary) that helps to tell the picture's story.
Imagine you overheard the people or objects in this picture talking, what were they saying? Use the conversation to tell the story of this event or the experience of one person at this event.	If you could talk to someone or something in this picture, what would you say? Write up your interview of the person or object; be sure the tone and style of your article matches who your audience is.	Tell a story of what happened before this picture was taken. Were other people or objects present? What events led up to this scene?	Tell a story of what happens next in this picture. Will some people or objects no longer be present? Will new people or objects appear? Why or why not?
Invent other objects that could be placed in this picture and seem to belong. Create the new picture and write or tell the story this new picture presents.	Create a new picture that relates to this picture. Tell the story of your picture, including an explanation of how it relates to the original image.	Describe what this image reminds you of or makes you think of using details from the picture and your own personal knowledge or evidence from other sources.	Find or create an image from your life that relates to the topic of this picture or the story that it tells. Explain how the pictures relate to one another and how they are similar, different, or both.
